

# Scholars

Boston Collegiate works hard to promote educational access and equity by providing all of our students with a rigorous college-preparatory education.

As they returned last fall, many students experienced difficulties readjusting to the classroom, but Boston Collegiate educators refused to compromise on the education we provide. According to Sarah Morland, Chief Academic Officer, "Our charge to teachers was not to remediate, but to **accelerate**. We encouraged a focus on student strengths, not deficits, and on making continued progress to typical academic benchmarks." She commends teachers for their dedication, observing that they "stuck with high expectations while ensuring that social emotional needs were being met. We saw amazing things happen."

The Boston Collegiate strategic plan includes a focus on deeper learning and **critical thinking**, encouraging students to approach their classes, and the world, with curiosity and inquiry. Classes such as Advanced Placement Environmental Science nurtured this mindset with project-based and student-led learning. Our regular showcases allowed staff members to share innovative teaching approaches and best practices.

When you step back and look at the progress made on this monumental journey from September to June, you see tremendous resilience, progress, and **promise** for the future.

#### **IMPACT SPOTLIGHT: One8 Foundation. PBLWorks and OpenSciEd**

Thanks to the generous support of the One8 Foundation, more than 40 educators received training from PBLWorks in designing and facilitating project-based learning - a teaching strategy that emphasizes problem solving, student-led inquiry, and real-world context. Our Middle School science classes used the OpenSciEd curriculum, another program supported by the One8 Foundation, to apply investigative processes to explore questions and phenomena.

# A Community

The past year was one of growth and evolution as Boston Collegiate continued to advance our goals for diversity, equity, and inclusion.

Boston Collegiate has long maintained a commitment to fostering a welcoming community that respects all members. Noha Elmohands, Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, notes that in the 2021-22 school year, "We met our annual objectives in all four priorities outlined from the Boston Collegiate strategic plan: restorative justice practices, family engagement, culturally relevant pedagogy, and teacher and staff diversification."

- The 2021-22 school year marked the second in our transition from a conventional merit/demerit system of discipline to one of restorative justice-a response to wrongdoing that prioritizes repairing harm within a community. Ten student leaders and all staff members received training in restorative justice practices from the Center for Restorative Justice at Suffolk University.
- We strengthened family engagement through quarterly family forums with the Executive Director and monthly cultural events. The Family Engagement team relaunched a dedicated parent and caregivers group, Be Connected, to broaden participation in school events and better gather input from families.
- We supported history teachers in creating lessons that felt relevant to student experience and continued developing plans to implement a revised history curriculum in the 2022-23 school year.
- Through participation in the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Teacher Diversification Initiative, a cohort of Boston Collegiate staff studied current best practices, located resources, and developed goals for attracting and retaining a diverse teaching workforce.



#### **Meeting the Needs** of All Students

Our staff works hard to meet the needs of all the students in our school community. Throughout his time at Boston Collegiate, Austin Neal received interventions and learning support from our Student Support Services team. Now starting his freshman year at University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, Austin plans to become a chemistry teacher.

As a community of students, teachers, and families, we've come together over food and through laughter to build **trust** and respect, to combat fear, and to create a community where all are welcome without judgment.

#### **IMPACT SPOTLIGHT: Tony Helies**

# Artists

Whatever a student's passion, Boston Collegiate gives them a chance to **explore** and grow.

Arts programming at Boston Collegiate helps students **discover** and hone talents that they pursue in college and beyond. Our visual arts curriculum has expanded for all students, and we are able to offer more in-depth training to burgeoning artists. With after-school activities including theatre, guitar club, step, and more, Boston Collegiate provides students with many opportunities to find their voices and flourish.

#### **SUPPORTING YOUNG ARTISTS**

Last year, Boston Collegiate saw student-artists shine, including senior Imarlieisis Isaacs. Imarlieisis received a Silver Key from the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards for her painting, Consequences. Nearly 7,500 works were submitted for this competition, the nation's longest running, most prestigious recognition program for **creative** teens. Imarlieisis's painting

was one of only 974 to be recognized with a Gold or Silver Key. Imarlieisis is the first Boston Collegiate student to be accepted into the Rhode Island School of Design and the studio program at the University of California Los Angeles, where she is enrolled this fall.

# Leaders

High School Principal Nadiva Monestime describes efforts to support students returning from the trauma and isolation of the pandemic, helping them find ways to come together and develop their leadership skills.

In her first year as principal, Nadiya invested heavily in **building community** and fostering joy within the High School. She worked with faculty to develop culturally relevant lessons that would encourage students to cultivate the critical consciousness required of **global citizens**.

Nadiya paid particular attention to the need for discussion spaces where every student could be seen and heard. For example, she refined a model for advisory (a period similar to homeroom) that encourages deep **connections** between teachers and students. By engaging members of the **student government** to lead assemblies and elevating student voices in the High School's restorative justice practice, she promoted student leadership and built students' stake in resolving issues at the school. Says Nadiya, "I appreciate and respect Boston Collegiate for its reflective nature, its research-based approaches, and, most importantly, how serving kids is at the root of everything we do."

#### **THE MAYOR'S YOUTH COUNCIL**

Three Boston Collegiate students - Ayden C., Jaleel C., and Wesley E., all Class of 2024 were selected to serve on the Mayor's Youth Council for the 2021-22 school for the 2021-22 school year. Confirmed by Mayor Michelle Wu, council members are responsible for representing the city government. Ayden also joined Boston Collegiate's Board of Trustees as the Student Trustee.

#### **REDUCING BOSTON COLLEGIATE'S CARBON FOOTPRINT**

Boston Collegiate is working hard to be a leader among charter schools when it comes to addressing the climate crisis. In 2021, Boston Collegiate launched its climate action program, which began with an evaluation of current practices and baseline emissions. The school also established the Climate Action Planning Committee, a group of volunteers that includes staff, students, and Foundation Board members, to lead our carbon-reduction efforts and bring awareness of this cause to the wider school community.

# The Class of 2022

All 75 graduating seniors earned acceptance to four-year colleges.

Since our first senior class in 2004, 100% of Boston Collegiate's diploma-earning graduates have been accepted to college.

The top three matriculating schools for 2022 graduates are Northeastern University — which has an overall acceptance rate of just 7.5% — University of Massachusetts Boston, and University of Massachusetts Dartmouth.


## **FY22** Financials Unaudited Revenue and Expenses, July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022


# REVENUE Total \$21,438,885

Thanks to significant state and federal funding for COVID relief, Boston Collegiate finished the fiscal year with a net income of \$2.5M, which we are investing in critical building improvements including essential upgrades to HVAC systems and necessary repairs and enhancements to our Upper School's building envelope.
